MSP warns of viral video

EASTON — The Maryland State Police and the Maryland Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force are aware of a viral video being shared through social media depicting apparent child pornography.

The video, which appears to depict an underage girl involved in a sex act, has reportedly been shared on various social media and internet service provider platforms across the country. Internet Crimes Against Children Task Forces in multiple states are investigating this video and are working to try and deter-

mine the origins of the video and identify the victim and suspect involved.

Police are reminding citizens that disseminating child pornography is illegal. If this video should be shared with you, do not share it with anyone else via email or social media. Instead, delete the video and make sure you report the video to your social media or internet service provider immediately.

Anyone with investigative information on the identity of child or the suspect in this video should contact Maryland State Police at 410-653-

4200. The investigation is ongoing.

The Maryland State Police Computer Crimes Unit coordinates the Maryland Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force. This is a combined law enforcement effort involving police departments across Maryland that is funded by a federal grant from the U.S. Department of Justice. Task Force investigators focus on identifying those involved in child pornography via the Internet and other related crimes that victimize children.

Drug task force makes 36 arrests during 2017

CHESTERTOWN — The Kent County Narcotics Task Force disrupted two heroin importation operations and dismantled a marijuana grow organization in 2017, according to a written year-end report Chestertown Police Chief Adrian Baker handed out to the Chestertown Mayor and Council at its Jan. 16 meeting.

Baker holds the chairman position on the task force, which has three investigators. Task force members include the Maryland State Police, the Maryland Department of Natural Re-

sources and the Office of the Kent County State’s Attorney.

In what Baker described as “cases of note for 2017,” the Kent County Narcotics Task Force also assisted the Maryland State Police heroin investigative unit in a covert initiative that resulted in more than 60-plus indictments. More than a kilogram of cocaine, 283 grams of heroin and hundreds of Oxycodone pills were seized. The primary targets were identified as Worton residents.

The KCNTF investigated

52 cases in 2017, including 32 criminal cases, according to the report. There were 36 arrests.

Five vehicles with a total value of \$23,800, five firearms and \$3,514 in cash were seized, according to the report.

Also seized: 207 grams of raw marijuana; 16 marijuana plants; 5.8 grams of powder cocaine; 2.6 grams of crack cocaine; 26.2 grams of heroin; and 107 prescription pills.

Baker’s report was presented for information. There was no discussion from the council about the report.

Police say man fires shots into vehicle after verbal argument

FAIRLEE — The Kent County Sheriff’s Office charged a Rock Hall man with first-degree assault, reckless endangerment and several weapons offenses after he allegedly fired shots into a vehicle.

Police identified the man as Edward Purnell Butler Jr., 42.

He is being held in the Kent County Detention Center without bail.

The offenses are alleged to have occurred Jan. 27 on Georgetown Road.

Deputies were dispatched at about 8 p.m. for a report of shots fired.

According to the prelimi-

nary investigation, Butler had gotten into a verbal argument with a woman, fired several shots into a vehicle on the property and then drove away.

Butler was located in the Rock Hall area and taken into custody without incident, according to a sheriff’s office news release.

Two firearms were located in the vehicle that Butler was driving, including one that matched the caliber and description of the gun allegedly used to shoot into the vehicle.

Butler also was charged with second-degree assault, use of a firearm in a

violent crime, possession of a handgun and malicious destruction of property.

He has a preliminary hearing Feb. 26 in the District Court for Kent County. At that time a judge will determine if there is probable cause to believe that Butler committed the offenses.

Cpl. Sean M. Maloney is leading the investigation.

The sheriff’s office Criminal Investigation Division and Maryland State Police assisted sheriff’s office patrol units during the preliminary investigation and apprehension of Butler.

CENTREVILLE — The Maryland Department of Planning is visiting Queen Anne’s County on Tuesday, Feb. 13, as part of an outreach effort for the new state development plan. Governor Larry Hogan signed an Executive Order in August, which began the process for the creation of a new plan called A Better Maryland.

A Better Maryland is a collaborative process working with local governments, recognizing common priorities, and identifying strategies and resources for responsible growth and resource protection. The first step will be a series of 24 listening session events in every Maryland County and Baltimore City. The purpose of the listening sessions is to

connect with the public, local governments, state agencies, and other stakeholders across Maryland and solicit their feedback on what should be included in a state development plan.

The public is invited to share their opinions at 6:30 p.m. Feb. 13 at the Queen Anne’s County Department of Planning and Zoning, 110 Vincit St., Centreville.
